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## Author Guidelines

### *The Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing (KJRN)* *Guidelines for Authors*

*The Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing* is an official journal of Korean Academic Society of Rehabilitation Nursing and published biannually. This journal is a peer-reviewed research journal devoted to report research that contributes to the knowledge base of the discipline of nursing including theory, practice, and education that provides a better understanding of human responses to illness and the promotion of health; serves an educational function through presenting reports or critiques of conceptual, theoretical, methodological, and ethical issues relevant to population with chronic illness or disability, cancer survivors, caregivers of chronic patients, and so on.

#### MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSION

The authors should submit their manuscripts through online manuscript submission system (<https://www.dbpiaone.com/kasren/index.do>). A manuscript must be accompanied by author checklist. Other correspondences can be sent by an e-mail to the Editor in Chief, Dr. Hye Jin Yoo, College of Nursing Science, Kyung Hee University, Seoul, South Korea (e-mail: [yoo hj@khu.ac.kr](mailto:yoo hj@khu.ac.kr)).

Articles that have been already published or submitted for publication elsewhere cannot be submitted to this journal. If the submitted manuscripts are originated in a thesis or dissertation, the author(s) should disclose the source. Articles that have been published in this journal cannot be published elsewhere without permission.

Accepted manuscripts become the property of the *Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing* and may be reproduced in other publications in whole or in part only with the permission of the *Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing*. *The Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing* reserves the right to edit all manuscripts to its style and space requirements and to clarify the presentation. *The Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing* requires all authors to sign a copyright transfer agreement after Editor's decision of accept their manuscript.

#### AUTHORSHIP AND ETHICAL ISSUES

Manuscripts will only be considered if they comply with internationally recognized standards of ethical research. The authors must be able to demonstrate that:

1. Research involving humans or animals has been approved by an institutional review board and has been conducted according to accepted national and international standards.
2. It is recommended that research be approved by an institutional review board prior to data collection.
3. Privacy of study subjects is maintained or informed consent obtained if they are in any way identifiable.

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4. The manuscripts concerned for research misconduct such as falsification, fabrication, or plagiarism in reporting research results are subject to be reviewed at ethics committee meeting for rejection.
  5. Any potential conflicts of interest are disclosed.
  6. All individuals named as authors qualify for authorship. All persons listed as authors should have participated sufficiently in the work to take public responsibility for the content of the manuscript. For the policies on the research and publication ethics not stated in this instruction, International standards for editors and authors (<http://publicationethics.org/international-standards-editors-and-authors>) can be applied.
  7. At submission, authors are required to disclose whether they utilized artificial intelligence (AI)-assisted technologies, such as Large Language Models, chatbots, or image creators, in the preparation of their manuscript. Authors should detail how these AI-assisted technologies were used in both the cover letter and the appropriate section of the submitted manuscript. If AI was used for writing assistance, this should be described in the acknowledgments section. If AI was used for data collection, analysis, or figure generation, authors should describe this use in the methods section. Chatbots (such as ChatGPT) should not be listed as authors because they cannot be responsible for the accuracy, integrity, and originality of the work-responsibilities required for authorship. Therefore, authors are responsible for any submitted materials that involve the use of AI-assisted technologies. Authors should thoroughly review and edit any AI-generated output. Additionally, authors should ensure appropriate attribution of all quoted material, including full citations, and should not list AI or AI-assisted technologies as an author or co-author, nor cite AI as an author.

## **JOURNAL CATEGORIES**

All submissions in the following categories will be deemed appropriate for consideration by the Editors and Editorial Board:

*Original Articles:* Original manuscripts which report completed research.

*Review Articles:* Critical presentations of topics of interest to those relevant to nursing theory, practice, and education. Generally by invitation only, but unsolicited reviews will be considered for publication if topical, of high quality and subject to peer review.

## **PEER-REVIEW**

All submitted manuscripts are treated as confidential. They are peer-reviewed by three anonymous reviewers. Criteria for initial consideration of papers submitted are originality, credibility of data, and applicability to the aims of the journal as a whole. Selection of articles for publication is based on their contribution to knowledge, value of methods, significance of findings, and relevance to contemporary nursing in rehabilitation.

Authors will receive notification of the publication decision, along with copies of the reviews and instructions for revision. The decision of the Editors is final. All review process will be done online.

## **MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION**

The text may be written in Korean or English. The abstract, tables and figures and references should be written in English.

Manuscripts should be typewritten, double-spaced, using a standard sized typeface and margins of at least 1 inch. Do not leave extra space between paragraphs. Tables and figures should be on separate pages.

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Manuscripts are accepted for publication if their contents, or their essential substance, have not been published elsewhere, except in abstract form or by the consent of the Editors.

Materials taken from other sources must be accompanied by written permissions for reproduction, obtained from the original copyright holder. Statistical methods should be identified. The length of manuscripts (including all references, tables and figures) should be no more than 20 pages.

Organize the manuscript in the following order: title page, abstract and keywords, text, references, tables, and figures. Number all pages in sequence from abstract. Title page should be on a separate file.

### ***Title Page***

Title page includes title; running head; names and affiliations of all authors; and disclaimer(s) (if any). The address, telephone (office and cell phone) and fax numbers, and e-mail address of the corresponding author should be listed separately. Information about all authors should be written in Korean and English.

Authors are required to sign a statement conferring the copyright to the manuscript to the *Korean Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing* and to fax it to the editorial office along with the self-checklist (forms to be downloadable from the website).

Acknowledgments of aid or criticism along with grantors may be listed in the title page.

### ***Abstract and Keywords***

An abstract of 200 words or less for articles (including reviews), should be typed double-spaced on a separate page. It should cover the main factual points, including statements of the purpose, methods, results, and conclusions. The abstract should be accompanied by a list of three to five key words for indexing purposes; be very specific in your word choice. Use MESH key words (<http://www.nlm.nih.gov/mesh/meshhome.html>) when possible.

### ***Text***

Headings and subheadings should be provided in the methods and results sections, and, where appropriate, in the discussion and conclusion section. Please keep the text clear and concise. The text of articles is usually divided into sections with the headings: Introduction, Methods, Results, Discussion, and Conclusion(s). Articles may need subheadings within some sections to clarify their content.

*Introduction:* Clearly state the need for this study and the main question or hypothesis of the study. Summarize the literature review or background in the area of the study.

*Methods:* Describe the study design, setting and samples, and measurements or scales, data collection procedure, intervention protocol, and analysis used.

*Results:* Describe the main results in a concise paragraph. This section should be the most descriptive. Note levels of statistical significance and confidence intervals where appropriate.

*Discussion:* Discussion should be based only on the reported results.

*Conclusion(s):* State the conclusions and recommendations for further study. Do not summarize the study results.

### ***Abbreviations***

Use standard abbreviations and units recommended in the Publication Manual of the American Psychological

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Association (7th ed.). Non-standard abbreviations should be defined the first time they appear in the text.

### ***Drug Names***

Generic names should be used. Proprietary names may be given (parenthetically) with the first use of the generic name.

### ***References***

References should be cited in the text by name(s) of author(s) followed by year of publication in parentheses, and written in English. The reference list should be typed alphabetically according to the APA style detailed in the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th ed.).

References to articles that are in press must state the name of the journal and, if possible, volume and year. If the authors are over six persons, write et al. after the sixth author's name. Write the full name of journal in Italic type. References to unpublished material, if essential, should be incorporated in the appropriate place in the text. Please include no more than 30 references. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of the references. Please recheck all references before manuscript submission.

### ***Tables and Figures***

Each table and figure should be placed on a separate sheet. Give table number consecutively and brief title at the top for each. All titles and contents of tables and figures should be written in English. The first letter of noun and adjective should be written in capital letter in title. The tables should be single-lined with invisible vertical lines. Footnotes to a table are typed immediately below the table. Abbreviation in the Table should be re-described in its full name. The mark should be used in the order of †, ‡, §, ¶, #, \*\*, ## and explained in the bottom line.

Other than as specified above, manuscripts should be prepared according to the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th ed.).

### **REVIEW PROCESS**

All contributions (including solicited articles) are critically reviewed by the Editors, members of the Editorial Board, and/or peer reviewers according to their expert areas. Reviewers' comments will be returned to authors. The decision of the Editors is final. All review process will be done online. All submitted manuscripts are sent simultaneously to three reviewers for blind peer review. Authors will receive notification of the publication decision, along with copies of the reviews and instructions for revision.

### ***Final Revised Manuscript***

A final version of the accepted manuscript should be submitted online. Include all material in one computer file (do not separate the abstract, tables, etc., into separate files).

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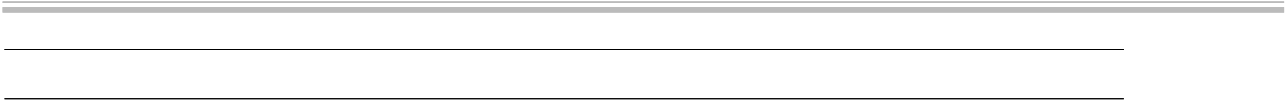

### 1. General guideline

- Original manuscript, checklist, and statement of copyright transfer should be dispatched via online submission management system.
- Manuscripts should be typewritten, double-spaced, using a standard sized typeface and margins of at least 1 inch.
- The manuscript consisted of title page, abstract, main text, references, and tables or figures.
- Text consisted of INTRODUCTION, METHODS, RESULTS, DISCUSSION and CONCLUSION.
- Terminology was written by those from recent edition of 'English-Korean Medical Terminology' published by the Korean Medical Association.
- Standard abbreviations are defined in a key at their first appearance in the manuscript, and are consistent throughout the text.
- The total page of the manuscript should be in 20 pages.

### 2. Title page

- Title, name of authors, affiliation was described both in English and in Korean.
- The address, telephone and fax numbers, and e-mail address of the corresponding author should be listed separately.
- All financial or material support for research was identified.

### 3. Abstract and Keywords

- Word count was equal to or less than 200.
- The abstract should include purpose, methods, results, and conclusion(s).
- A list of keywords at the end of abstract should be based on Medical Subject Heading (MeSH) in Medline.
- Number of keyword was five or less.

### 4. Main text

- Main text consisted of PURPOSE, METHODS, RESULTS, DISCUSSION and CONCLUSION.
- The order of the subtitle was described according to the Instruction for Author Guidelines.

### 5. References

- Every article in REFERENCES were cited in the main text.
- All references were written in English.
- Number of reference was 30 or less.
